Short Description

The course is primarily intended for BA students with an aim to presenting Romanticism and developing their understanding of its nature through a close analytical reading of assigned texts from the major poets of the period. The concept of the Romantic Imagination should be studied as a major break from the Neo-Classical Age. Recurrent elements of English Romanticism should be traced, as well as the characteristic romantic modes and theses. Besides, The core course introduces the student to some themes, trends and genres in Romantic poetry. The student is expected to be acquainted with the social, political, historical and literary background of the period prior to starting the textual study of some representative poems of the era. (Note: the instructor can choose suitable poems to represent that period)

Course Objectives

This Course aimed to:

- Introduce students to Romanticism as a literary movement.
- Shed light on the heralds of romanticism as well as to the prominent figures of this school.
- Provide students with good background about the cultural and social contexts of that period.
- Enhance students' skills of listening and speaking through reading traditional and metrical poems aloud.
- Write creative and critical analysis of poems.
- Elaborate upon the use of the figurative language and literary devices such as simile,

metaphor, personification, alliteration; etc.

Plagiarism
